

...Executive Summary (page 2 of 2)

Our objection to the Appellant's request is predicated on three fundamental issues:

- 1. The very limited public parking available for members of the public who want to access Whale Beach for sport and recreation will be seriously compromised by an expansion of the venue limit
- Parking availability at Whale Beach (146 stalls) is already extremely limited compared to other Northern Beaches locations
- Public transport is not an option unlike other beach areas meaning the only viable option to access the beach is to drive and park; for this reason, a public car park is essential is access is to be equitable
- Fresh data captured across many weekends demonstrates that many users will simply not be able to access the beach –on average on a warm weekend day there is just under 2 parking stalls available out of the 146...
- ...and this is before the additional demand created by the 70-person limit that is already approved for the venue
- Adding even further demand for scarce parking stalls by allowing a further 46-96 (total of 116 166) patrons and employees will
 essentially transfer the benefit of a public asset to a private owner
- 2. The congestion already seen on busy weekends as people jockey for scarce parking stalls will exacerbate the safety and wellbeing of visitors to the beach
- Congestions already results in many, many instances of illegal parking, which is not policed;
- In addition, notwithstanding the 10 km/h speed limit signposted throughout the parking lot, recent data demonstrates that the average speed observed is more than double this limit
- · Association members have observed near crashes involving cars and young children as drivers seek parking spots
- Note: All people entering the water from the Surf Club have to cross the parking area to access the beach.
- 3. Beyond the extra burden on the very limited parking, and safety concerns, a venue of the size proposed by the Appellant will significantly impact on the access and amenity of the area, especially given the late-night service of alcohol.


Excessive speed already contributes to a dangerous parking lot at Whale Beach – the average speed is more than double the signposted speed limit




The 85th percentile speed or 85th percentile rule is a traffic engineering standard used to set the speed limit for automobiles on a public roadway. It refers to a speed where 85% of vehicles travel at or below. Likewise for the 95th percentile...

Even now, parking violations are not being adequately policed. There is effectively NO enforcement (Data provided by NBC under GIPA-Fol Application)



Parking availability is near zero (average of 1.5 stalls out of 146) on a broad crosssection of weekends and Public Holidays and this is *before* the 70 person venue is built



Note: Surveys conducted on weekends and public holidays at circa 1:00 PM to indicate peak demand periods The parking analysis done to substantiate even the 70-person cap is flawed and is markedly inconsistent with resident experience – Sundays at mid-day during peak summer season sees the parking lot already full with overflow traffic taking up illegal park spots.



The cumulative effect of allowing the appeal will be to displace *actual* public users of the parking lot and in essence transfer 20 % of the lot to private use



Today there are on average only 1.5 parking stalls available at peak times; once the 70-person limit venue is opened, available spots will decrease to a negative 23 spots. If the Consent Order is approved by L&E court, the cumulative available spots will be an aggregate -30 spots taken up. In other words, private use by the developer will displace actual demand of public users of the parking lot.

Note: This assumes <u>a very conservative assumption</u> used by RMS that a venue only requires 1 parking stall for every 3 users. We dispute that this assumption is valid here given the lack of public transport and the high cost of taxi service to the area – i.e. in our view, the ratio will be more like 1:2 or worse.

The Friends of Whale Beach Association is comprised of community members concerned about protecting equitable access to Whale Beach for all users and preserving the amenity of area for local residents, Northern beaches residents, all Sydneysiders and visitors who enjoy this unique and beautiful part of our Australian coastline.
